**Approval of Minutes** – Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Public Comment Agenda Items** – Orange County Legislator, Chris Eachus, wanted to comment on two of the items on tonight's agenda. The first is the MTA Mobility Tax, Legislator Eachus stated that without a doubt we are all very disgusted with the way it was presented to us and hope that the Governor will rescind it. The County has sent a resolution requesting that it be rescinded. The second issue Mr. Eachus commented on was the New York State Budget bill: there is an issue of changing from elected positions for Town Clerk, Receiver of Taxes, and Superintendent of Highways to be appointed positions. Legislator Eachus has sent a letter to the Governor requesting that they take this issue out of the Budget Bill. In closing, Mr. Eachus stated that it was a good time to be a part of Cornwall with ten children receiving the Sojourner Truth Awards, two basketball teams doing fantastic, we are all very proud of our kids.

Councilman MAZZOCCA announced that tonight was Councilman McGUINNESS's birthday; everyone wished him a happy birthday.

**Agenda Item #1 – Resolution – Authorize Supervisor Sign Playground Grant** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows: "GUIDELINES to prepare Grant Agreements for non-construction projects \$50,000.00 and under – Fiscal Year 2008 – 2009," provided by the New York State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation. That D. KEVIN QUIGLEY, as Supervisor of the Town of Cornwall, is hereby authorized to sign legal documents on behalf of the Town of Cornwall and that such signature is acknowledgment of the acceptance by the Town of compliance with all terms and conditions of the grant agreement, to be executed for

the grant. Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilwoman KRAFFT.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #2 – Resolution – Authorize Supervisor to Sign Community Development Block Grant** – Supervisor QUIGLEY advised that this was for the 2009 Community Development Block Grant for Hazen Street Sidewalk/Curbing Improvements in the amount of \$75,000.00. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: That the Supervisor be and hereby is authorized to execute the Community Development Block Grant Program Municipal agreement FY-2009 together with any and all documents necessary to effectuate the completion of the grant award program. That the Town Board does hereby agree to comply with all of the requirements listed on the accompanying schedules and to provide the County of Orange with the necessary insurance and indemnification. Motion to approve was made by Councilman McGUINNESS, seconded by Councilman CLARK.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #3 – Resolution – Memorandum of Understanding – Assessor** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows: WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Cornwall (“Town”) is desirous of resolving vacation time issues with Ronald Fiorentino, the Town’s Assessor (“Fiorentino”), and WHEREAS, the Town and Fiorentino are prepared to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding setting forth the understanding and agreement between the parties, and WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the Town to settle this matter with Fiorentino in a timely manner, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: That the Supervisor be and he hereby is authorized to execute the Memorandum of Understanding annexed hereto and made a part of this resolution on behalf of the Town and directs that a fully executed copy of the Memorandum of Understanding be provided to Fiorentino. Motion to approve was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman McGUINNESS.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #4 – Resolution – Board of Ethics** – Supervisor QUIGLEY advised that this is in reference to a vacancy on the Board of Ethics. WHEREAS, PURSUANT TO Town of Cornwall Town Code Section 20-7(a) the Board of Ethics of the Town of Cornwall is a five-member Board, and WHEREAS, pursuant to Town of Cornwall Town Code Section 20-7(A) all members of the Board of Ethics are required to reside in the Town of Cornwall, and WHEREAS, Thomas A. Sheppard, a duly appointed member of the Board of Ethics, no longer resides within the Town of Cornwall, has not been in communication with the Town of Cornwall and has not attended meetings of the Board of Ethics, and WHEREAS, by reason of the foregoing it appears that said Thomas A. Sheppard no longer qualifies for membership on the Town of Cornwall Board of Ethics, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: 1. That the Town Board does declare the position on the Board of Ethics previously held by Thomas A. Sheppard vacant. 2. That the Town Board shall accept and consider applications to fill the said vacancy on the Town of Cornwall Board of Ethics. Motion to approve was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #5 – Resolution – Authorize Supervisor to Sign Refuse Agreement CCSD**

**2008/2009** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows: WHEREAS, heretofore the Town Board has entered into an agreement with the Cornwall Central School District for the pick up and collection of refuse and garbage, and WHEREAS, it is appropriate for the Town to enter into a formal agreement for the period July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009, and WHEREAS, such agreement is before the Town Board, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: That the Town Board does hereby approve entering into an agreement with the Cornwall Central School District for the pick up and collection of refuse and garbage for the year July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009 and authorizes the Supervisor to execute the same. Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #6 – Resolution – Authorize Supervisor to Sign Refuse Agreement CCSD**

**2009/2010** – Supervisor QUIGLEY explained that this is the same agreement as above except that this is for the period of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010. Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilwoman KRAFFT.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #7 – Resolution – Dog Fees** –Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows:

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Cornwall has a local law before it entitled: A local law to amend Town Code Chapter 77 “Dogs” to amend the fees due and payable upon impoundment of an animal, and WHEREAS, the Town Board has determined that it is appropriate and in the public interest to adopt certain amendments to the existing law, and WHEREAS, a proposed local law amending Chapter 77 of the Code of the Town of Cornwall has been prepared, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: 1. That the movant of this resolution does hereby introduce the proposed local law entitled: A local law to amend Town Code Chapter 77 “Dogs” to amend the fees due and payable upon impoundment of an animal, and 2. That a public hearing on the proposed local law is set for April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2009 at 7:15 P.M. and that due notice of the same is directed to be given by publication and posting. Motion to set Public Hearing was made by Councilman MAZZOCCA, seconded by Councilman CLARK.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item # 8 – Resolution – MTA Tax** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows:

WHEREAS, the Town of Cornwall received notification that the Metropolitan Transportation Authority has proposed the creation of a new “mobility tax” to be applied in all twelve counties in the MTA Region, to be imposed on all employers and self-employed individuals in the amount of one-third of one percent of all wages paid, and WHEREAS, the payroll tax would be applicable to all businesses, for profit and not-for-profit, as well as governments whose employees pay into Medicare (FICA), and WHEREAS, the Town of Cornwall and its residents and businesses already contribute to other taxes and/or fees to the MTA, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: That this Town Board does hereby oppose this tax proposed by the MTA because of its unfairness to Town residents. The Town Board believes the tax burden should be allocated based upon use and access to services rendered. That the Town Clerk be directed to

forward a certified copy of this resolution to the MTA as well as the appropriate State representatives noting the Town's opposition to this tax. Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #9 – Resolution – Office of Town Clerk** – Supervisor QUIGLEY advised that this is a Resolution that is in opposition of the proposed changes in the New York State regarding The Town Clerk and other officers in Town Government, such as Receiver of Taxes. Supervisor QUIGLEY read the Resolution as follows: WHEREAS, the office of Town Clerk and the Receiver of Taxes is currently an elective position pursuant to Section 20 of the Town Law of the State of New York, and WHEREAS, legislation has been introduced in the New York State Legislature which would permit towns to convert the office of Town Clerk and Receiver of Taxes to an appointed position subject to a permissive referendum, and WHEREAS, Municipal Home Rule Law Section 10 already provides that a town may adopt a local law changing the office of Town Clerk from an elected to an appointed position subject to a mandatory public hearing before any change could occur, which a permissive referendum would not, and WHEREAS, the election process allows Town of Cornwall residents a choice in selecting their Town Clerk which is how local government should be; government by the people not the State of New York or through political patronage, and Whereas, the Town Clerk is, under several sections of New York State Law, the official record keeper for all Town records and should be an independently elected individual providing impartial service to the members of the Town government and the public at large, and WHEREAS, there would be no financial benefit or savings to the Town of Cornwall in making this change from elected to appointed office, NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows: That this Town Board does hereby oppose the proposed legislation which would permit towns to convert the office of Town Clerk and Receiver of Taxes to an appointed position rather than an elected position and, That the Town Clerk be directed to forward certified copies of this resolution to Governor David Paterson, State Senator William J. Larkin, Jr. and Assemblywoman Nancy Calhoun noting the Town's opposition to the proposed legislation. Motion to adopt was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #10 – Wind Turbines** – Attorney Cordisco advised that the Planning Board received two inquiries from individuals looking to site a wind turbine for home energy as well as reducing their cost of electricity. The problem is that the Town does not have a local law that allows wind turbines. The Town attorneys have been looking at, and will make a proposal to the Town Board to consider in the next meeting or two. Attorney Cordisco advised that while attending the Association of Towns Conference, there were a number of presentations regarding Green and Global Warming issues. Mr. Cordisco advised that the DEC is making changes to the SEQRA environmental assessment forms, which are going to require the long form EAF in which you have to evaluate what impact your projects have on global warming. He further advised that there are a number of communities that are changing their local laws to be

more environmentally conscious. There are about ten communities in New York State that have adopted regulations that require all new construction to meet Energy Star Guidelines, which most new construction does already but now it would be mandatory; this is something the Board may want to consider.

**Agenda Item #11 – Highland Engine Easter Egg Hunt** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read a letter from the Highland Engine Company requesting permission to use the Town Hall Grounds for their Annual Easter Egg Hunt. Motion to approve was made by Councilman MAZZOCCA, seconded by Councilwoman KRAFFT.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #12 – COVAC – Training** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read a letter from COVAC requesting permission for eleven (11) to attend the JEMS Conference for training. Motion to approve was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman McGUINNESS.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #13 – Surplus – Vehicles** – The following two vehicles are to be declared as surplus and put out for bid:

**Agenda Item #14 – Computers – Police Department** – Supervisor Quigley read a memo request from Chief Todd Hazard to purchase computer equipment as follows:

One Dell PowerEdge T100 Server -- \$2,950.00

One SQL Database License -- \$700.00

Three Dell Optiplex 360Minitowers for \$2,250.00 (\$750.00 ea.)

Total cost \$5,900.00 to be reimbursed through the Larkin Member Item Grant.

Motion to approve was made by Councilman MAZZOCCA, seconded by Councilwoman KRAFFT.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item # 15 -- Card Scan System – Police Department** – Chief Todd Hazard requested approval to purchase a cardscan system from L-1 Identity Solutions at the NYS bid price of \$16,313.00 – funds still available in member item grant. This purchase is necessary as the Department of Criminal Justice Services has announced that effective January 2010, they will no longer accept inked fingerprint card submissions sent through the mail; they will only accept

electronic submissions. Motion to approve was made by Councilman MAZZOCCA, seconded by Councilwoman KRAFFT.

**Roll Call VOTE:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #16 – Conservation Advisory Council – Adopt Highway Program Cleanup –**

Supervisor Quigley advised that they would like to be covered under our insurance while they are doing this project. Councilwoman KRAFFT advised that our attorney would like to review this so that he may set any guidelines that may be necessary. Also, we would also be asking for a certificate of insurance from any other organization that will participate in this event.

Councilman CLARK stated that in the past, the Department of Transportation has required certification from the organization to be trained before they went out to do the cleanup.

Councilwoman KRAFFT advised that the Conservation Advisory Council has just now completed the permit application and have not yet been approved, but feels that as a Board, we would be better protected after speaking with our attorney to set some guidelines for us to all work together and that this should be a stipulation of the approval for the Conservation Committee, and this should be included in the motion. Motion to approve with the above stipulation and subject to the DOT was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call Vote:** Unanimous Aye.

**Hudson River Day** – Supervisor Quigley advised that the Village was holding an event to celebrate the Hudson-Fulton-Champlain Quadricentennial at Donahue Memorial Park on June 7<sup>th</sup> 2009 and were requesting a donation and/or use of our senior bus. On checking with Jayne Hums from Orange County Office for the Aging, we are allowed to provide them the use as long as we do not ask for reimbursement from the County. Motion to donate the use of the senior bus for this event was made by Councilman McGUINNESS, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call Vote:** Unanimous Aye.

**Agenda Item #17 – Geese** – Councilman CLARK advised that last year the Board voted to approve the purchase of two remote control toys, a boat and a ATV to deter the geese, but unfortunately these items are no longer available. There is now a hovercraft available which is especially designed for geese and will be the same cost for the one unit as what we approved last year for the two. Mid-Hudson Hobbies is currently sold out and has put in a new order. Councilman CLARK will keep us posted.

**Correction to Minutes of February 9<sup>th</sup> 2009** – Registration for Summer Playground will be held in the Town Recreation Department (Now located in the building previously known as the Dog Shelter - 534-2070) starting Monday, May 18<sup>th</sup> daily 9:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. and Monday, June 1<sup>st</sup> 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Motion to approve the dates was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call Vote:** Unanimous Aye.

**Records Clerk Grant** – Supervisor QUIGLEY read a letter from Town Clerk, Elaine Tilford Schmeer, advising the Board that our Records Clerk, Linda Ovsak Giardella, will be doing work on

a grant-funded map cataloguing project. Ms. Giardella will be paid at a rate of \$12 per hour for this project, for other records clerk duties, she will be paid at her current rate of \$10.61 and will prepare separate vouchers. The salary-funded portion of the grant is \$12 per hour, for a total of \$1794.00 for 149.5 hours, or 7 ½ weeks of grant-specific work. Motion to approve was made by Councilwoman KRAFFT, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call Vote:** Unanimous Aye.

### **Committee Reports:**

**Police Training:** Councilman MAZZOCCA advised that Sergeant Douglas Schofield attended a course in Evidence and Property Room Management that was provided by the Division of Criminal Justice Services at no cost to the Town. Police Officer Edward Ogden attended a course in Commercial Vehicle Criminal Interdiction that was held at the Rockland County Police Academy at no cost to the Town. Sergeant Steven Dixon attended an Interview course that was held at the Westchester County Police Academy at no cost to the Town.

**Police Department News:** The Orange County Police Chiefs' Association recently purchased a Firearms Simulator Training machine and has had it installed at the Orange County Police Academy. The machine will provide simulated tactical firearms training and will be available to all member agencies at no cost. Police Officer Jon Harbison was recently trained as an instructor in the firearms simulator.

**Community News:** With the spring weather finally upon us, the number of pedestrians enjoying the weather is sure to increase. Motorists are reminded that under Section 1151 of the New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law, they are obligated to yield to pedestrians in and at crosswalks.

**Recreation Department:** Councilwoman KRAFFT advised that there will be an upcoming registration for Summer Playground. There are several trips planned this year, Washington, D.C., Canada, and Wildwood. There is also a trip to Atlantic City on April 23<sup>rd</sup> 2009. If interested please contact the Recreation Department.

**Henry Hudson & the Quadricentennial Committee:** Councilwoman KRAFFT thanked the Hudson Highlands Nature Museum for their starting off our celebration. Other organizations throughout the Town are scheduling their events and will be added to the website — Cornwall09. NYS Quadricentennial Committee will be holding a Flotilla on June 7<sup>th</sup> 2009. The Village is having River Fest on June 6<sup>th</sup> and Hudson River Day on the 7<sup>th</sup> and the boats will be seen from the landing. Councilwoman KRAFFT also thanked the Board for allowing her to be the Delegate at the Association of Towns Conference. She was honored to be appointed the delegate as her mother was elected President of the NYS Association of Towns, and she was able to cast a vote for her. Councilwoman KRAFFT has copies of all of the legislative resolutions. The Association of Towns has hired a lobbyist who will try to support the local municipal towns for any resolution and bills that will be passed in the state legislature and the number one bill that they are working on is to preserve and strengthen Home Rule.

Councilwoman KRAFFT recommended that you contact your local, state and county officials regarding the possible consolidation and/or shared services and dissolution of towns and tell them of your concerns. You can also go on-line to the Association of Towns to get this information. Councilwoman KRAFFT stressed the importance of this as she doesn't want our residents to have to drive to another municipality or to Goshen to get the services that we now currently supply. Some studies have been done by a County organization and we are looking at \$300,000 in tax increases that the Town of Cornwall may have to come up with – Councilwoman will be presenting this to the Board at the next work session.

**Highway & Sanitation:** Councilman McGUINNESS advised that it has been a long and horrendous winter season and that we have far exceeded our budgeted amount for salt. Hopefully this is now at an end. Councilman McGUINNESS stated that we have had some minor fender-benders involving Town vehicles but thankfully no one was injured.

**Warrant #3:** Supervisor QUIGLEY called for a motion on Warrant #3. Motion to approve was made by Councilman CLARK, seconded by Councilman MAZZOCCA.

**Roll Call Vote:** Unanimous Aye.

**Public Comment:**

**Graham Keldor** asked when he could get a copy of the Memorandum of Understanding between the Board and the Assessor, Ron Fiorentino. Supervisor QUIGLEY advised him he could get a copy through the Town Clerk's office. Graham stated that he agreed with the Board on the MTA tax. He feels that every payroll is assessed that it will affect most the seniors and those who cannot afford to pay it.

**Al Secor** wanted to speak for the geese and wanted to know why we want to get rid of them. The Supervisor advised that it was mostly due to the excrement. Mr. Secor said they were here first a long time ago and is concerned that he is hearing "kill the geese" while he would like to get rid some politicians. Supervisor Quigley stated that they are incredibly messy and over-populated. Councilman CLARK advised that we are just trying to re-locate them. Councilman CLARK further stated that one of the reasons the pond will not freeze is due to all the excrement. He stated that the best way to get rid of them is to stop feeding them, oil the eggs or shoot them. Geese season is March and September but unfortunately we have houses too close for that. Hopefully if the public will stop feeding them, we can have our park back. Al stated that he was content if we could get rid of them without killing them.

**Jack Boyle** from COVAC asked about the status of the some of the contract issues he discussed with the Board at the last work session. Supervisor QUIGLEY advised that he received some late e-mails from our attorney that the Board has not yet had a chance to review.

**Tony Incanno** advised that he was not sure if all the Board members had received the following letter and he would like to read it into the minutes.

Good evening, ladies and gentlemen of the Town Board:

We have received information about Legacy Ridge Article 78. It is a 2-legged stool lacking stability and proper standing. It is structurally defective. A review of the information previously presented to this Town Board indicates that the structural instability was anticipated and preventable. The following facts were presented to the Town Board and to the Town Legal Counsel:

- A. A copy of the 2006 Article 78 of Woodbury residents challenging Woodbury's high density laws. The article 78 was defended by the legal team of Drake, Loeb, Heller, Kennedy, Gogerty, Gaba, & Rodd PLLC, Attorneys for the Town of Woodbury.
- B. A copy of payments for legal services rendered in researching and defending Woodbury high density laws.
- C. A copy of cancelled checks dated, June 7, 2006 certifies that Legacy Ridge and WPC3LLC (Suburban Junction) provided equal funds for the legal defense of the high density laws that in 2007 were applied to Legacy Ridge high density development.
- D. We requested that The Cornwall Town Board appoint an outside counsel to handle the Article 78, challenging Woodbury high density laws. We explained that an independent counsel was critical in avoiding legal complications and necessary, to secure the participation of potential plaintiffs owning property near the proposed Legacy Ridge development.
- E. Failing to receive the Board's approval for an independent counsel, a compromise was presented for a co-counsel to assist the Town's present legal firm.
- F. We asked to be named as a plaintiff, but sadly, did not receive a response.
- G. The Article 78 briefs were filed lacking any input from us and deficient structural stability. We were effectively, locked-out of participation in this legal process.
- H. A prominent Cornwall Taxpayer became so alarmed of the legal silence and proposed to pay 50% of the legal fee for a review of the case by an independent counsel. As usual we did not receive a reply.

Recently, we became aware of new developments on the Legacy Ridge Article 78. Let us be clear, if the information is correct, the legal briefs of the Article 78 as filed, are sadly disappointing. It was foreseen and preventable. This misstep provides a challenge and an opportunity to structurally repair the legal integrity of our case by employing an outside counsel. Members of the Town Board, we again ask for an independent counsel to review the Legacy Ridge Article 78 and to provide advice and direction on this legal matter. As you know, we have turned over to the town, funds contributed by the taxpayers for the Article 78 legal fund. It is therefore appropriate that the Board vote on the request for an independent counsel at the earliest public meeting. Please note that not only the taxpayers of the school district and the present legal firm will be in jeopardy in the future, most town functions will be also affected. For example, as you are presently searching for ways to provide access to the overcrowded Little League facilities, be mindful that 300 to 600 new positions will be required in the future if the Article 78 is not successful. Thank you for your time and patience. Working together we will succeed as we have done previously against greater odds. If any members of the Board have any questions, please do not hesitate to call me. Sincerely yours, Anthony Incanno: SOS

In closing, Mr. Incanno stated that one thing that is working in our favor is the economy and hopefully if things go the way they are, they will never do the project. The other thing in our favor is if the right people get elected. However we cannot rely on this. Mr. Incanno stated that this is not a reflection on the Town's attorneys, but they should recuse themselves as Mr. Loeb has previously done. The tax expense to the residents will be very high.
